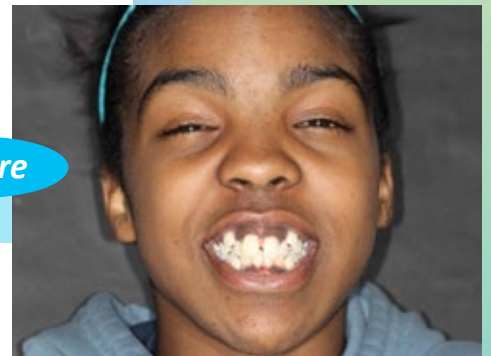
Cosmetic case of the issue

In May I helped to teach a course at the Utah PCC course (see article on page 2) that centered around what the public thinks of as "cosmetic dentistry." I always tell the participants in these classes that I feel like every treatment we do has a cosmetic dentistry component. There is not a line where you stop doing "regular dentistry" and start doing "cosmetic dentistry." Having said that, some treatments are more dramatically "cosmetic" than others. I would like to share a couple of recent cases where the patients were very enthusiastic about their results.

Did you know that there is no specialty in dentistry called cosmetic dentistry? Dentists sometimes create advertising that makes it look like they are cosmetic specialists, but the Michigan Dental Association and the American Dental Association frown on these tactics and can take a dentist's license away for this misleading practice.

ADA 2015 course helps Michigan dentist save mother's life

Waterford, Mich. — Dr. David Wright never expected that the continuing education course he took at last year's ADA annual meeting would help save his mother's life. But that's exactly what happened.

In the course Anatomical Dissections of Occlusion and Implant-Related Structures, instructor Dr. Terry Tanaka pointed out severely blocked carotid arteries in a cadaver. Dr. Wright would later recognize similar blockages in his mother.

"Dr. Tanaka, a facial pain expert, discussed that while there are few symptoms of the internal carotid artery blockage until one has a stroke, the external carotid artery often has characteristic facial and neck pain associated with this condition," Dr. Wright said.

"My 81-year-old mother had been having similar symptoms for the past year and had been to many physicians to investigate this pain. No diagnosis had been made. No one suggested carotid blockage as a potential cause."

Unrelated to this issue, Dr. Wright had sent his mother to an imaging center for a cone beam radiograph to understand her options for dental implants. A couple of days after returning home from the ADA annual meeting in San Antonio, he received her cone beam and radiography report. Because of what he had just learned in his CE course, Dr. Wright recognized

his mother's potentially lethal problem.

"It noted a great deal of calcification of the carotids," he said. "During the next week my mother met with a vascular surgeon and, with further testing, it was determined that she had over 95 percent blockage on both sides and surgical intervention was immediately needed. The two endarterectomy procedures were performed in December, saving her life."

Helping him to recognize a potentially life-threatening problem with his mother definitely made the CE course pay off in an unexpected way for Dr. Wright, but he is doubly pleased that it also delivered professionally.

"The course is helping me each day as I examine my patients," he said. "I can better understand what I am palpating in the exam, and how it relates to function and pathology."

and implant-related structures course because of the caliber of the CE presenter.

"I had taken several temporomandibular joint disorder lecture courses from Dr. Tanaka and they were excellent," he said. "He remains one of my favorite dental educators."

Dr. Wright plans to attend ADA 2015 in November.

"I think that the ADA meeting has morphed into the best CE meeting," he said. "It always was the greatest overall dental show, but the CE offerings are fantastic now, too. I will always try to make the ADA annual meeting in the future."

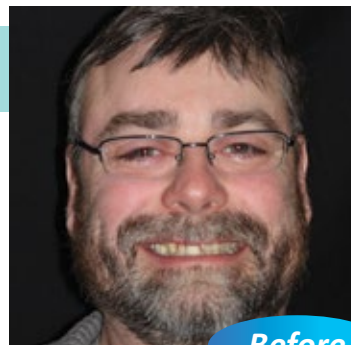

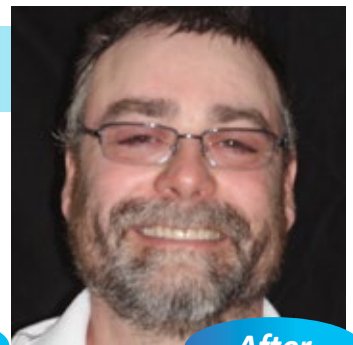

THE NEW OLD

A couple of years ago I was discussing some somewhat involved implant treatment with a wonderful man. He was in his 80s and, therefore, it was standard procedure to get a medical consult before I did his surgeries. He mentioned that

and he was very happy with his new implant-supported teeth. This was a man who was not old in his early 80s; why are so many people old at far younger ages?

The corollary to this is the person who says, “Well, you know, I’m on a fixed income.” Now, I try to always be nice because I understand what they are saying, but I want to ask them “Who ISN’T on a fixed income?” We all are on fixed incomes; however, those of us with parents AND children to watch over have plenty of ways to drain that fixed income. Many of my most complex, most dramatic cases came from humble retired folks who decided “it was their turn” after

years of taking care of parents and children. I think that these people did not define themselves as old; they did not let fear define them, either.

I hope that all of you, at whatever age you are, have mentors who show you how to age with energy. I am so very lucky to have friends who are decades ahead of me, exhibiting energy and passion unknown to many 30-year-olds. I hope that I can follow their leads for a long, long time. It seems like the New Old is not an age, but is more a combination of one’s choice along with good fortune. May God bless you and keep you passionate and energized!
